In a most outstanding and moving ceremony the Parsons College Wall of Honor Class of 2011 took their places on the wall of Alumni Hall at the 3rd Annual Wall of Honor celebration Saturday, October 8, 2011 at the Stephen Sondheim Center for the Performing Arts in the Fairfield Arts and Convention Center.

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Another distinguished class of 10 Parsons Students/Alumni were presented to an enthusiastic crowd of over 100 family members and friends.

Parsons College Foundation President Dave Neff opened the program and introduced previous Wall of Honor inductees, Bob Gamrath, Lee Gobble and special guests. Mayor Ed Malloy welcomed everyone to Fairfield and each inductee was then introduced by a presenter and presented their plaques by Dr. Bob Tree. Following the presentations of honorees, a Barhydt organ recital was performed by Werner Elmker, the alma mater was sung, and the plaques were unveiled in Alumni Hall. A luncheon followed at the Fairfield Country Club. Let us introduce this year's Class of 2011 honorees:

Doug Billings '63, the first inductee, was presented by Mike Gilpin. Doug, who now lives in Murrells Inlet, NC, enjoyed an outstanding career as an executive and entrepreneur in the hotel and hospitality industry, primarily with the Holiday Inn Corporation, both nationally and worldwide.

He started his own company which purchased hotel property and products for investment groups worldwide.

At Parsons, Doug was a president of Sigma Phi Epsilon, the Inter-Fraternity Council, and worked for the college for a brief time. Doug has a history of becoming involved in his community and was the youngest person ever to be appointed Commissioner of the Iowa Development Commission. He firmly states that, he "loves the thrill of the deal," and has no plans to retire...

John Glotfelty '48 was told he was too young for Medical School after graduating from Fairfield High and Parsons. After graduating from both of those schools in three years each, John continued to plod forward and was not to be deterred.

When finally accepted at the Louisville School of Medicine, he simply ranked #1 in his class all four years.

John became a medical doctor and worked for the U.S. Public Health Service. He is highly regarded in the field of ophthalmology. John has served as officer and board member on numerous medical-related professional organizations and also was appointed to the State Board of Medicine by the governor of Florida.

John also served as a colonel in the Iowa National Guard. He was presented by his son Bob Glotfelty...

George Long '58 lives in Urbandale, IA. After graduating from Parsons where he was a member of Zeta/Sigma Phi Epsilon fraternity, he received state and national recognition as a teacher, coach and athletic director.

George was named Iowa and Central Region Athletic Director of the Year and National Athletic Director of the Year. He was chairman of the National Boosters Club, and was named National Booster of the Year.

In 1982, George was named Urbandale Citizen of the Year. He was presented to the Wall of Honor by longtime friend Lee Kane...

Richard Reece '64, who was presented to the gathering by his wife, Joan, lives in Marina Del Rey, CA. Richard became a national and internationally acclaimed real estate educator/executive and president of Appraisers, LLC. He founded the Russian Society of Appraisers.

At Parsons, Richard founded Pi Kappa Alpha Fraternity and was the Parsons Outstanding Graduating Senior in 1964. Over the weekend, he was also presented a Certificate of Appreciation by the PKA National which was given to him by those of his fraternity brothers in attendance...

Charles Reed '42 graduated from Parsons College summa cum laude. He was a meteorologist-base weather and typhoon officer. Charles was assistant executive director of the U.S. Air Force Office of Scientific Research and executive director/program officer for the National Academy of Science.

Over his career he received a number of awards including, the Legion of Merit, the U.S. Air Force Commendation Medal-First Oak Leaf Cluster, and the National Academy of Science's Distinguished Service Award.

The late Charles Reed was presented by his daughter Lynda Reed Leech.

Ida Nakashima Schneck '46 lives in Greenwood Village, CO and was presented by her dear friend Dorothy Bell of Fairfield. Ida overcame great adversity to get to Parsons. She, as were all people of Japanese ancestry, was incarcerated in special camps during World War II. Working through several sources, fortunately, she was allowed to leave to attend college.

After graduating Parsons, she continued her education and became a doctor of medicine. She also earned certification as a pediatrician and specialized in adolescent medicine. Ida retired in 1992 then taught at the University of Colorado Medical School.

She is now a volunteer who reads medical and scientific material for students who are blind or dyslexic at The Learning Center. Ida is a member of the American Medical Women's Association and the Society of Adolescent Medicine.

Steven Smith '67 lives in Alexandria, IN and he was presented to the Wall of Honor by his brother Paul.

At Parsons he was vice president of his graduating class, homecoming chairman, served on the inter-fraternity council and was a member of Lambda Chi Alpha Fraternity.

After Parsons and earning a masters degree at Ball State University, Steve served as director of admission, vice president, president and legal council for the Cabrillo Pacific University before entering the legal profession. He became a public defender in the juvenile courts.

Steve now serves as president of the Community Center and is an active leader in the development of young people in his town...

Bob Spencer '57 resides in Des Moines, IA and was presented by long-time friend Dave Neff. After leaving Parsons, Bob became a pioneer and visionary in the promotion of NCAA Women's Sports. As a basketball coach he accumulated 660 wins during his 34-year career. Bob mentored the Parsons Wild-Kittens basketball team until the college closed

in 1973. He then went on to coach at Fresno State where he became the winningest coach in the history of the school. He was awarded the Jostens-Berenson Service Award by WBCA recognizing his lasting legacy.

At Parsons he was a member of the Zeta/Sigma Phi Epsilon Fraternity before embarking on his teaching/coaching career which also included a stop at John F. Kennedy College, a Parsons satellite school. A WBCA executive saluted Bob, saying, "His tireless dedication to not only women's basketball, but to women's sports in general, is second to none!!"

Robert Stiller '67 is now retired and splits time between homes in Palm Beach, FL and Waterbury, VT. The experience of a wonderful cup of coffee in a Vermont ski lodge led to the purchase of a small company and establishment of a billion dollar coffee outlet empire.

Bob, who was ably presented by John Braidwood, is the founder of Green Mountain Coffee Roaster. In 2001, he was named Forbes Magazine entrepreneur of the year and the company ranked 16th on their list of 200 best small companies. Recently Forbes announced Bob has been added to their list of 400 Wealthiest Americans.

He leads the Stiller Foundation, a non-profit organization aimed at educating and supporting initiatives to bring people out of poverty. Bob continues to oversee the GMCR as CEO of the board of directors and is a certified meditation instructor. While at Parsons, he earned degrees in accounting, mathematics and business administration...

John reported that Mr. Gobble, who, with a some assistance and a walker, attended both the ceremony and luncheon Saturday, appeared a little frail but looked good. He was very alert, and mentally sharp.

The attendants told John that the primary issues of concern regarding the 96-year-old "haberdasher emeritus" relate to the number of falls he's taken recently.

Mr. Gobble is a member of the Wall of Honor and he touched nearly each and every Parsons student during his day, as either a landlord, employer, or supplier of fashions.

John presented Mr. Gobble with a "We're Thinking of You" card from he, and a number of Lee's Parsons friends. When asked if he had any words for his many Parsons admirers, Lee said, "Yes, tell them this turkey ain't done yet!"

SPOTLIGHT... Thom Giuntoli '63...

Thom Giuntoli left Fairfield with a degree, his college sweetheart who he married shortly after, and a clear path to theological studies at Dubuque Theological Seminary. He was awarded a Masters of Divinity Degree and ordained as a minister in the United Presbyterian Church in 1967. Over the next few years, Thom served as pastor of a small church in Warsaw, IL and as Associate Minister at a Presbyterian Church in Washington, IA.

For years he toyed with the idea of becoming a Navy Chaplain and then went onto make it happen. In 1974, he made Navy Chaplain and was commissioned a Lieutenant Junior Grade in the Navy Chaplain Corps.

Thom's first tour of duty took him to Camp LeJuene, N.C. and the 2nd Marine Division. Shortly after, he was promoted to Lieutenant Commander and selected to attend Naval Post Graduate School. Thom was given a choice and selected Princeton Theological Seminary and went onto his Doctoral Studies in the area of Pastoral Counseling and Care.

After several tours through South Carolina, he landed at Parris Island and became the Assistant Chief of Staff for Religious Ministries and supervised 14 chaplains, and 33 enlisted persons, as well as serving on the Commanding General Staff. It was there Thom formalized his "servant leadership" skills, essentially meaning that the leader isn't afraid to dig in and assist the subordinates.

Thom continued his move up the ladder and was promoted to captain, and was nominated to become the United States Sixth Fleet Chaplain in Gaeta, Italy. At Sixth Fleet his team of chaplains serviced all Naval vessels and personnel within the Mediterranean area.

One of the most interesting aspects of this duty was taking over 1700 sailors and marines to midnight mass at the Vatican each Christmas. And also, developing a relationship and exchange program with the Commandant of the Swiss Guard, which was founded in 1506 and remains the oldest active military in the world.

Following Italy and several other assignments, Thom was hoping to remain at home in the states. But the Navy surprised him again with a nomination to become fleet chaplain for the commander and chief, United States Naval Forces Europe in London, England. In this position, Thom became the principal adviser on matters of religion, ethics, and morals. He coordinated religious support for more than 90,000 U.S. military personnel and families in his area of responsibility.

Thom says those duties were the most challenging of his Naval career. "I supervised and mentored 57 chaplains and 80 enlisted personnel throughout Europe and those chaplains serving on ships in the Mediterranean. Additionally, I provided chaplains to the Balkans during our involvement in Bosnia and Kosovo," he said.

Now considered the chief of chaplains in Europe, this afforded the opportunity to interact with the chaplain corps of a large number of other European countries. We also worked with European military leaders to help further develop their roles of leadership, and convince them to view their chaplains as a crucial part of their command, and not just someone to be used on Sunday morning for chapel and aiding problem soldiers.

Finally, Thom came full circle with his last tour of duty as group chaplain for 2nd FSSG and returned to where it all began, Camp Lejuene, N.C.. In 2003, his command was sent to Kuwait and then onto Iraq. Later that year, after 30 years in the U.S. Navy, Thom retired. He and his wife (Betsy Anne Enyedi) returned to South Carolina and are enjoying retirement.

Looking back, Thom said, "As I reflect, I owe our dear college - Parsons - a debt of gratitude - for it was there that I got my second chance to a college education and (realized) the desire (I had) to contribute to our great Nation."

The Alumni Write.... A Final Goodbye to a Best Friend...

I have always hated goodbyes. Some are easier than others. I do not like to drag them out. I prefer to just say goodbye and leave it at that. Drawn out goodbyes are painful. A second round of goodbyes moments later seem less genuine. For this reason, I sometimes go out of my way to avoid another after the initial goodbye has been said. The worst goodbyes are the ones that are forever - the kind where you know you will never see that person again. These goodbyes can be titled "the forever goodbyes."

A short time ago I said goodbye to one the best friends I've ever had. We met at Parsons over 50 years ago. Over the years we vacationed together with our wives and by ourselves. We'd met in various cities to watch baseball games, go to movies and just "hang out." We returned to Fairfield many times to see old friends, walked the streets, and reminisced about those great days at Parsons. My friend Andy Bry-Nildsen PC'65 and I were close. Andy and I were so close, both in spirit and through our long association. I named my only son after Andy.

I called my friend several months ago, just a few hours after the doctors said there was nothing more they could do for him. Andy had cancer and they told him he had two weeks to two months to live. I told him, "Andy, I haven't given up hope and don't you give up either." He replied, "I haven't given up, but I need a break." Shortly thereafter, I visited him in the Cancer Center at Penn State University. His family, friends and I were by his side. On the last day of my visit it was evident Andy was fading. He had been in a coma for 24 hours.

I approached his bed and stated, "Andy, you are the best friend I've ever had. I love you, we all love you." Miraculously, he opened his eyes, looked at me, smiled, and then his eyes closed. It was then "I lost it." I started crying, hugged his wife, his daughter, and left the room to catch a plane home. The tears flowed freely. I had just said goodbye to a wonderful person, my best friend, and I would never see him again. Andy died peacefully in his sleep a few days later. I traveled back to his Pennsylvania town to pay one final visit and to serve as a pallbearer at his funeral. (see Memoriam - Bry-Nildsen)...



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My Road to Parsons... Lloyd Jerome '51

MY ROAD TO PARSONS... I graduated from Centerville High School in 1945 and received a scholarship to attend the University of Iowa. After being there a few weeks, I walked into a room with over a thousand freshmen. I said, this is not the place for me and went home. Shortly thereafter, I attended a junior college basketball game, was invited to play basketball, and ended up enrolling and spending two years in junior college. I drove a school bus to pay my tuition.

Over the next year between driving a bus, teaching, and serving in the Iowa National Guard, I earned enough money to finish my last two years and get a degree. In the National Guard, there were seven of us, O.B. Nelson was our platoon leader, and the company commander was Captain Bob Gamrath. One time during inspection a funny thing happened. We did not have our winter uniforms for inspection, so O.B. had us wear our summer outfits and placed us in the back row. When the inspector came to our row, he asked O.B. who we were. O.B., who had been drinking, said, "These are my African Corps."

In 1949 I chose Parsons because several of my family members were there. I arrived that fall, decided to play football, and lived in the Zeta (Sigma Phi Epsilon) fraternity house. I remember the homecoming bonfire vividly. The freshmen girls had to wear their PJ's and be kissed by members of the football team. At Halloween time we went on hayrides, did hot apple cider and donuts, and had snowball fights. In the spring it was campus cleanup time and the entire student body participated. Fraternity "Hell Week" was something else - the male pledges couldn't talk to the female pledges and visa verse.

As a senior, I knew more people and was a starter on the football team which went 6-0 until the last two games. At football practice one day, O.B., who liked to get involved in the scrimmages showed up wearing an old leather football helmet. Someone hit him on the head, his head swelled, and it took several of us to pry the helmet off his head. Needless to say, we were required to run a few extra laps around the field that day. The basketball team also was coached by O.B. Nelson, the best coach I ever had. We won the South Conference but lost the championship game.


I liked most of my professors but got a scare at graduation time when they told me I would not graduate. Seems as though they slipped a mathematics requirement in on me. With the help of Tib Young and summer school, I graduated. I also taught swimming which helped with tuition and ended up having two great years at Parsons. In the evenings we used to go to the "Why Not Tavern," drink beer and sometimes pool our money to buy quarts of beer. I also delivered bakery goods to several locations. I was up at 4 AM and delivering through rain, sleet and snow.

I've lived in western Iowa for most of my years and never heard much about Parsons except when it was closing its doors. I wish I had known about the homecomings and activities that followed. But in 2010, while surfing the internet, I came across the website for the Parsons College Alumni Association. I joined immediately, attended the 2010 reunion and have contacted a few classmates. In my opinion, the PCAA has helped many students reconnect with one another. I encourage all of you to join and do the same...

DIGGING UP THE PAST..."Parsons and the NFL"

Parsons College suited up and fielded football teams from 1893 to 1971. This year (2011) marks the 50th anniversary of one of the finest of those football teams to take the field during the illustrious history of Parsons. Yes, the 1961 Parsons Wildcat gridders made their mark in the state of Iowa, the Iowa Conference and in the national N.A.I.A. rankings.

Coached by Gary Nady, the Wildcats went undefeated in conference play at 9-0, won the Iowa Conference, and ranked 10th in the nation (6th on defense). They were invited to the Mineral Water Bowl in Excelsior Springs, MO where they lost a tough one to Northeast Missouri State. A number of players on that team won Conference honors and were so highly touted they attracted attention from the scouts of a number of NFL teams.

The late Lou Wilson was pursued by the Minnesota Vikings and spent several years on their taxi squad. Monty Versteeg, who held the distinction of being the biggest college football player in the country during that era, was invited to the Chicago Bears training camp for a tryout. And place-kicker Jimmy Ostrander has never lost the letter he received from Vince Lombardi inviting him to the Green Bay Packers training camp.

But perhaps the most illustrious of the Parsons football players to get a brush with the big time NFL was running back Nathaniel Craddock. Nat was a 220-lbs running back from Des Moines, IA. Big # 27 ran over and through all obstacles. Some say that if there was a downside to Nat Craddock, it was his eyesight, which resulted in his difficulty gathering in the short passes out of the backfield.

But nevertheless, Nat was drafted by the (then) Boston Patriots in the 22nd round of the AFL draft. Unverified sources of information tell us he made it through camp until the final cut. From there he went onto the Canadian Football League and played for the Montreal Alouettes for several years.


Upon his return to the states and working his way through some red tape issues related to the draft, Nat ended up with the Baltimore Colts. Although he only made appearances in several games, he is listed in the NFL players encyclopedia. It should be noted, while with the Colts his teammates included the likes of Johnny Unitas, Lenny Moore, and Big Daddy Lipscomb.

Amazingly, Parsons College was a target on the hit-list of colleges for NFL scouts to shop for talent in the 1960's and early 1970's. The visits were productive, and a number of Wildcats gridders were selected in the draft over those years. However, in addition to Craddock, our e-news research uncovered only one other of the Parsons draftees who made an NFL team and appear in a regular season game.

Bruce Cortez, PC'66, a defensive back, was that draftee. He was drafted in the 16th round by the New Orleans, made the team, and wore # 47 for the Saints.

Others that we were able to confirm being drafted to the NFL, in no particular order were, Frank Antonini, PC'68, a running back, who was taken in the 17th round by the Philadelphia Eagles; Allen Marcelin, PC'68, a wingback/defensive back, was drafted 10th that same year by the Los Angeles Rams; Jim McKoy, PC'70, a running back, was selected by the Denver Broncos in the 13th round of the 1970 draft; and John Lanier, PC'70, another halfback, was an 11th round pick by the Green Bay Packers in 1971.

Two other former Parsons affiliates, who didn't make it to the NFL spotlight on the field, went on to post prominent coaching careers on the sidelines. Frank Falks PC'67 played and coached at Parsons and worked through a number of college programs prior to becoming a tight ends/running backs coach with the San Diego Chargers, Detroit Lions and St. Louis Rams.

Mary Braden came from Southwest Missouri State and University of Missouri. He did not attend Parsons but launched his coaching career with the Wildcats before moving on to coaching special teams with Denver, San Diego, the St. Louis and Phoenix Cardinals, and Cincinnati Bengals.

Clearly, Parsons College was a Mecca for small college football and was headed to the big time during the mid-late 1960's, just as it was in so many other sports and areas of education. We can now only imagine, and fathom a guess at that fabled question, that haunting, and lingering question that we know will be repeated BUT never answered...."WHAT COULD HAVE BEEN??????"

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
